I phoned ALACE on Saturday morning. I simply confirmed where I worked, that I was a paid up member and that was that. The person I spoke to was actually on holiday but passed my details on to one of the tremendous consultants who works for ALACE. I was contacted on the Monday morning and I never had to pick up the phone again. ALACE did all the follow up work, the real peace of mind of having someone to talk to who really understood local government – who had real experience and who could offer current, practical and helpful advice was absolutely priceless at that time of need, as it is today.
